What you should know about the LVACC Churchyard

This ring-binder on the above matter is issued to each of you for your retention whilst you remain a Community Councillor. When you retire from being a Community Councillor, please return it to the Clerk so that it can be issued to the new Councillor.

<u>Some History! The LVACC</u> Churchyard has been the responsibility of this Council since 1920.

At the 1st March 1984 Community Council Meeting, it was suggested that an attempt should be made on the 'clearance' of the Churchyard. But, from the Minutes, we learn that Cllr Dr J Keidan "felt nothing should be done as the Council had already tried in vain to carry out such a scheme". It is apposite to mention that Dr Keidan lived at the Manor House immediately alongside the Churchyard.

When I was appointed Clerk and Churchyard Safety Officer twenty years ago, a proper start was made to clear the Churchyard and the completed clearance lasted until Cllr Ray Bowen a year ago spent two days with his tracked digger removing the final obstacles to safe passage of visitors and others; this was at no cost to LVACC. Please see photos attached. Costs have been kept to the minimum as a result of the help of volunteers (myself included!).

We can be proud of what has been achieved. Don't let it slip again!!

LVACC Section of Perimeter Wall to Llangattock Churchyard

From its 1920 transfer to the Parish/Community Council, the perimeter stone wall had not received any attention of note until 2009/10 when safety issues arose in preparation for the Charles Rolls Centenary Anniversary when very large numbers of visitors were expected.

It was necessary to award the work to a stonemason who submitted an estimate of \pounds 3,500 to 'make safe'. It so happened that the Clerk was able to obtain an award of \pounds 1,000 from a very unexpected source and this allowed the top-section wall to be fully restored which brought the total cost to \pounds 4,050.

Prior to the commencement of the work, there was a section where *Lonicera* bushes from the neighbouring ground had penetrated and undermined the wall. In preparation to the stonemason's work, the Clerk spent two days clearing the dislodged stones and made ready the foundation for the stonemason to commence work.

As Safety Officer for the Churchyard, the Clerk on his routine inspections periodically checks the perimeter wall for any signs of *Lonicera* penetration in/on the stonework.

On his 3rd January 2013, he recorded "Cllr R Bowen and self inspected the perimeter wall – satisfactory. Also called on neighbour to request that he controls his *Lonicera Niteda* from penetrating the wall".

On his 4th November 2013 inspection he recorded "All monuments inspected. None requiring attention. *Lonicera* growth from neighbouring property a cause for concern".

On his 2nd February 2016 inspection he recorded "Checked perimeter wall. No sign whatsoever in presence of intrusive *Lonicera* in stonework". He reported this in the Minutes of the February Public Meeting.

Only two other instances of major wall damage have occurred during the past twenty years.

During a major sewerage blockage affecting the Mansion sections, part of the wall had to be removed to allow construction of an adequate 'connection'. This was restored at no cost to the Community Council – but it took a long time!

Near to the Rolls Graves, a large tree collapsed onto the wall and damaged a section. It took a very long time for the 'owner' to pay for the repair as he argued at the time that the actual freeholder of the land had not been established. It should also be mentioned that the nearby Yew Tree was badly damaged and is the reason for some missing branches.


February 4th Monthly Meeting..2016

However, as the *Lonicera* is still thriving strongly on the owner's land adjacent to the perimeter wall, regular checks will continue to be <u>essential</u>.



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Costs and Care of Perimeter Wall

Great care and checking is required to avoid unnecessary expense in maintaining this wall in safe condition.

Periodic checking is absolutely necessary!

Pages 2 and 3 refer to damage of unknown origin.

Page 4 shows damage caused when a tree fell from a private garden alongside the Rolls Monument. The owner of the garden had to repair the wall and remove all the timber at his expense.

This was also an example where members of the public were prohibited from entering a cordoned-off section.

Any repairs to the wall must be carried out by a competent builder.



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Why are some Branches missing off The Yew Trees ?

The Yew Tree alongside the Rolls Monuments suffered baldly when a mature tree from the adjoining property collapsed partly onto it following a storm.

There was further damage to it and other trees during a subsequent storm when the Yew Tree nearer the Church was also damaged.*

A tree surgeon was engaged on both occasions to remove damaged braches leaving the trees to 'look-tidy'.


*It would be apposite to mention here that the tree surgeon's report also drew attention to a tree branch which had reached the Church roof (opposite the gate) from land belonging to the nearby farm. As a Community Council, we did not take any action whatsoever other than to pass the report to the Churchwarden. Shortly afterwards, it was noticed that the offending branch had been removed.

B Only parishioners (ie persons normally residing in the parish) persons dying in the parish, ex-parishioners and persons whose close have been buried in the churchyard and persons on the Register of Electors at the date of death, are entitled as of right, to have cremated remains in existing graves.

C No discrimination shall be made between the cremated remains of a Member of the Church in Wales and of other persons.

Under no circumstances whatsoever may any trees be planted in the Churchyard section administered by this Community Council. Maintenance costs of caring for trees planted in the past are a heavy drain on the finances of our Council. We have seen the damage caused by a single tree costing several thousand pounds.

REGULATIONS

FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF CHURCHYARDS VESTED IN THE REPRESENTATIVE BODY OF THE CHURCH IN WALES

Regulation 18. "<u>TREES.</u> No trees shall be planted in a churchyard without the written consent of the Archdeacon".

Glass, Pottery, etc

No glass or pottery vases except those which are incorporated as an integral part of a gravestone.

"Save for silk flowers and Remembrance Day poppies, no artificial wreath or flowers, shrubs, permanent vases or containers, ornaments, chippings, gravel, paving stones or kerbs shall be placed on or around any grave or area for cremated remains in the churchyard".

[The old churchyard 'dump' of broken glass, pottery, wire, etc. was taken away from the site by me – yes, by the wheelbarrow load to a large trailer – quite a task! RGN]

Inspection of memorials

A visual inspection should be the next step in assessing the risk of a memorial falling. It takes little time, uses simple common sense and judgment, and yet acts as an effective early warning system to help operators prioritise memorials that need more detailed inspection.

> The routine use of mechanical test instruments as inspection tools is not recommended. Results from these instruments are liable to overestimate the actual risk. The approach suggested above will enable the operator to assess the memorials in their grounds as either secure and stable or insecure and requiring action, and a mechanical test will not add to this judgment. However, where this judgment is not so clear, the operator may need to consult a specialist engineer or memorial mason for advice.

Where a visual check suggests no stability defects, a hand test can help confirm that assessment or identify stability problems - this test involves no tools or equipment and is intended to provide 1 support to the visual checks.

B When the path leading to the War Memorial was tarmacked, we were asked to make it wider than originally planned. This was to allow coffin bearers to walk on a hard surface. (This we did and managed to obtain a grant)!.

C_As you can see from page 3, we all have a part to play and to use common sense.

Periodically, the very edge of the path and around the War Memorial requires spraying with Roundup (as can be seen at the moment) to avoid grass creeping onto the hard surface.

Dear Simon

Macadamised Pathway leading to War Memorial

I am sorry to have to raise what appears to be such a trivial matter with you. Under the 2009 directive from the Ministry of Justice, as a community council, we have a duty to ensure safe passage to the War Memorial and also the Charles Rolls Memorial.

A problem arises when grass cut in the unused plot is left on the pathway. If swept immediately following its cutting, it only takes 5 - 6 minutes with the brush provided in the porch. When left unswept, the job takes well over an hour using the wire rake and brush. However, despite several requests, we have not been successful.

The other worrying problem is that the edges of the tarmac are being damaged presumably by the tractor wheels. (We see no reason why this grass area should be cut as long grass would not present a fire risk to the Church building).

Again sorry, for having to involve you in such a simple common sense matter. We have tried – but failed.

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
